### North Santiam Canyon Economic Development Update March 2016

#### **Update:**

- The Infrastructure Finance Authority (IFA) sent out a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the North Santiam Regional Wastewater Analysis and Land Inventory in December. The RFP was broken into two tasks.
  - Task 1 includes options for governance over a shared regional water/wastewater district, along
    with a conceptual design of constructing wastewater systems that can serve Idanha, Detroit,
    Gates and Mill City and estimated costs and phasing of possible construction projects for
    decision making purposes. (Selected: Keller Associates)
  - Task 2 includes an interactive GIS database to identify all commercial and industrial zone
    properties in the N. Santiam Canyon region to determine the "commercial or industrial shovel
    readiness" and the impact commercial development would have on the water and wastewater
    systems and suitability for drain fields or other water/wastewater facilities. (Selected: Maul
    Foster & Alongi)
  - On March 1<sup>st</sup>, Bob Pankratz, Barb Young, Danielle Gonzalez from Marion County, Greg Benthin from the City of Gates, and Karen Homolac from the IFA chose the contractors for the above tasks. Negotiations are happening now with the selected contractors.
  - The timeline for the study is for an initial draft by July 2016 and a final draft by Oct 2016.
  - Once the contractors have been notified, IFA and Marion County will host a kickoff meeting
    with community members. Expect an invitation to that meeting in the next couple of weeks.
  - Marion County was recently awarded a Federal Lands Access Program grant of to \$6,570,757 to fix the 3 land slide areas along the North Fork Road.

#### In Process:

The Comprehensive Economic Development Study (CEDS) is underway with the Mid-Willamette Valley
Council of Governments. Ideas presented from Marion County's Emergency Management, Planning,
Engineering and Economic Development divisions have been integrated to maximize any possible
federal and state dollars that are available for economic development purposes. This includes North
Santiam Canyon infrastructure projects that lead to economic development.

#### **Next Steps:**

- On April 2, 2016 at 6 p.m. at the Gates Fire Hall, Marion County will be hosting a Q&A Session as part of the annual State of the County series. This meeting is open to all. Topics to include: public safety, public health, water/sewer concerns, emergency preparedness and other community driven topics of discussion.
- Marion County is working on identifying a team of about 10 people with a mix of county, city and private citizens to implement the recommended plan from the feasibility study discussed above. This group would likely begin their work in June. During different stages of the implementation, over the next few years, it may be imperative to swap out people with different expertise, so keep offering. Thank you to the many people who have already offered their time and talents.

### Broadband project:

Many small, rural communities within Marion County lack available and reliable broadband internet to serve the needs for its citizens. This need impacts the local employment economy, community development, safety, and overall livability of these unique rural communities. Citizens, home based medical care providers, emergency management, schools, community organizations and businesses all rely on consistent, rapid and accessible internet service. Marion County is working toward maximizing opportunities for rural communities through public/private partnerships to make high speed internet broadband accessible.

### North Santiam Canyon Economic Development Update

Numerous studies and reports over the last couple of decades have identified these items as barriers to economic development in the former timber communities of Mehama/Lyons, Mill City, Gates, Detroit and Idanha in the North Santiam River Canyon:

- 1. Water/Sewer Infrastructure
- 2. Broadband
- 3. Access to Employment

Marion County is targeting these communities to address key infrastructure concerns that have kept these communities from realizing their economic goals. By leveraging each other's resources regionally, these communities can work together to enhance their shared vision and economic goals.







### **Targeted North Santiam Canyon Projects Underway:**

- Marion County has partnered with the Infrastructure Finance Authority (IFA) for The North Santiam
   Regional Wastewater Feasibility Study and developable lands inventory for decision making purposes;
   final draft due October 2016
  - Task 1 includes options for governance over a shared regional water/wastewater district, along with a conceptual design of constructing wastewater systems that can serve Idanha, Detroit, Gates and Mill City (possibly in Lyons) with estimated costs and potential phasing of construction projects
  - Task 2 includes an interactive GIS database to identify all commercial and industrial zoned properties in the N. Santiam Canyon region to determine the "commercial or industrial shovel readiness" and the impact commercial development would have on the long range water and wastewater systems. Property identification for the construction of drain fields or other water/wastewater facilities
- Broadband Internet Feasibility Study to address current lack of consistent and reliable internet service by addressing the current and future needs of industries and the community by ensuring access to high quality internet based medical care, education and to encourage small business development
- Regional Health Assessment with Oregon Health Authority and Marion County in North Santiam River
  Canyon communities focusing on clean water/wastewater infrastructure, access to healthcare services,
  transportation (CARTS and safe access to schools), and clean air (issues pertaining to smoke from field
  burning and air quality)
- Marion County Emergency Management is updating its Hazard Mitigation Plan and developing an emergency asset annex in the North Santiam region for economic resiliency and community sustainability



### **Historical Perspective:**

As the northern spotted owl was listed as a threatened species by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in 1990, the Northwest Forest Plan called for the protection of the owl and its habitat; the old growth forests of Oregon, Washington and California.

In 1998, the Opal Creek Wilderness and Opal Creek Scenic Recreation Area were designated. This designation of more than 13,538 acres altered the landscape and timber economy of the communities along the North Santiam River. With the designation of Opal Creek, \$15 million was approved to offset the loss to this timber rich region, but the funds were never appropriated and city budgets were decimated. These communities were no longer able to make necessary infrastructure investments as a result of the federal funding that never materialized.


### **North Santiam Rural Recovery Development**



Even as the overall economic picture in Marion County has improved, some rural communities in the county have experienced more than 25 years of economic distress spurred by the collapse of a once vibrant timber economy. Beginning in 1990, the rural timber communities of Mill City, Gates, Detroit and Idanha in Marion County, Oregon found themselves constrained by the habitat protection of the Northern spotted owl under the Endangered Species Act followed by a series of federal forest management acts which significantly curtailed the timber harvesting industry. In 2000, a \$15 million recovery package was approved by the U.S. Congress to aid the region from the loss of their primary local industry by changes in federal policies. The North Santiam Economic Opportunity Study was completed and submitted to federal regulators as a plan for the distribution of the aid but the money was not further appropriated by the U.S. Congress and the promised funds never matriculated.



In 2014, The Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Government updated the original 2000 study and further explored the needs of the distressed rural timber communities of Mill City, Gates, Detroit and Idanha. The communities reside along a pristine North Santiam River in a narrow canyon on Oregon Hwy 22. The report provided focus for state and county officials as it highlighted the need for repair and large scale investments in basic infrastructure as it was cited as the primary discouraging factor from employers from locating or expanding businesses in this beautiful area. The report detailed critical infrastructure gaps within the North Santiam Canyon communities that are increasingly becoming cost prohibitive to repair and maintain which is further complicated by the dynamic geology of the region and land use permitting. The lack of and deteriorating nature of the infrastructure assets coupled with diminishing population and reduced tax

receipts have denied them the financial resources needed to make the vital long term investments.

Where there is a desire in each community to expand business and employment options, but not a capacity to actually accomplish it, Marion County has prioritized infrastructure development for these affected cities to address the underlying foundational base for rural economic development. The targeting of these communities allows for the leveraging of diverse public and private resources to spur complimentary economic investments. The regional approach focuses on basic infrastructure for water, sewer, broadband internet, health, employment, housing and transportation and allows for sustainable protection of the rural lifestyle these communities desire.
